Explain how individuals progress through Maslow's hierarchy and the importance of fulfilling lower-level needs first. Identify and describe the holistic needs of individuals, linking to Maslow's hierarchy. Define and distinguish between chronic and acute conditions, providing examples of each. Define disability according to the Equality Act 2010 and identify different types of disability (cognitive, physical, mental, sensory).
